
Good Friday Stations of the Cross

The Preparatory Prayer


L: The Lord be with you.

The First Station Peter Denies Jesus

C: Because by Your holy cross You have redeemed the world.

Gospel Reading Luke 22:54-62

Meditation by Charles Spurgeon

"What was the reason why Peter thus sinned? I answer, first, that it was because of his fear of man. Bold Peter became an arrant coward. And, ah! how many have denied their Master because they have been afraid of a jest or a jeer! ...Perhaps the chief reason for Peter's denial of his Lord was his confidence in himself. If Peter had felt himself to be weaker, he would really have been stronger; but, because he felt so strong in himself, therefore he proved to be weak as water, and so denied his Master...Those of you, who have abundance of life in you, and plenty of force of character, must mind that you have also the force of grace, lest your [strength]... should become your ruin in the time of trial. He is well kept whom God keeps..."

L: All of us like sheep have gone astray. Each of us has turned to his own way.


C: But the LORD has caused the iniquity of us all to fall on Him.

Gospel Reading Mark 14:60-65

Meditation by Bo Giertz

"The strange thing is that this judgment, the most unjustified verdict ever given on earth, was at the same time the most completely just verdict ever given. Jesus kept secret something that the high priests knew nothing about--He carried the sins of the whole world. He took the burden of guilt for the whole world upon Himself and made it His own. From where He stood, in front of His accusers, He was responsible for their sins also, for their envy and lust for power, their deceit and heartlessness. He took upon Himself all the trespasses of everyone in the past, in the present, and in the future. That sin warranted death. Without knowing it, Caiaphas sentenced his own sin, and all our sin, to the punishment that since the beginning of time had been waiting to deal with the wickedness and the selfishness that said no to God's love: that death must die."

L: The Lord has laid on Him the iniquity of us all.

C: For the transgression of His people He has stricken Him.


Collect

Jesus Judged by Pontius Pilate

Gospel Reading Luke 23:13-25

Meditation by Nils Laache

"But who, who are the evildoers? And where are they found? You think of Caiaphas and Pilate. Yes, but they are closer to us than that. I think you know who they are. Look yourself in the mirror, soul! Indeed Jesus is standing in your place. It is your filthy rags He is wearing, your sentence that falls on Him. But more and more see in His humiliation, God's indescribable and immeasurable love for us men, and learn what salvation awaits all who believe in Him!"

L: Surely our griefs He Himself bore, and our sorrows He carried.


C: Yet we considered Him stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted.

The Fourth Station Simon of Cyrene Carries the Cross

L: We adore You, O Christ, and we bless You.

C: Because by Your holy cross You have redeemed the world.

Gospel Reading Luke 23:26-27

Meditation by Johann Gerhard

"We are made like unto Christ through tribulation...Thus, we must follow Him upon the way of cross and tribulation. How could it make any sense if Christ had to hang on the cross and you wanted to constantly live in happiness? Would you be wanting to have your Paradise in this life, even though Christ had to suffer so much adversity here? Certainly not! Instead, let it be dear to you that you are made like unto Christ through tribulation. If He sanctified our Baptism by His Baptism, then He also has sanctified our cross and tribulation with His cross and tribulation. That's why the true believers' suffering and adversity is called a cross, because they bear it after the crucified Christ just as Simon of Cyrene did. Confidently follow after; Christ is carrying the heaviest portion."

L: He Himself bore the sins of many.

C: And interceded for the transgressors.


Collect

C: Because by Your holy cross You have redeemed the world.

Gospel Reading Luke 23:33-38

Meditation by Martin Luther

"For every nail that pierces Christ, more than one hundred thousand should in justice pierce you, yes, they should prick you forever and ever more painfully! When Christ is tortured by nails penetrating His hands and feet, you should eternally suffer the pain they inflict and the pain of even more cruel nails, which will in truth be the lot of those who do not avail themselves of Christ's passion." Once one understands this then they can see Jesus', "friendly heart and how this heart beats with such love for you that it impels Him to bear with pain your conscience and your sin."

L: They have pierced My hands and My feet.

C: I can count all My bones, people stare and gloat over me.

Collect

L: Let us pray:

C: O Jesus, teach us to meditate on Your crucifixion aright. Instruct our hearts to despise our sin that caused Your wounds, and enlighten us that we may see Your great compassion for us, O friend of sinners. Amen.

L: Lord Jesus, crucified,

C: Have mercy on us!

The Reproaches

L: Thus says the Lord, O my people, what have I done to thee? Wherein have I afflicted thee? Answer me!

The Sixth Station Jesus Dies

C: Because by Your holy cross You have redeemed the world.

Gospel Reading John 19:31-37

Meditation from Burnell Eckardt Jr.

"Jesus here has fallen asleep in death, His side is pierced, and out pours blood and water. Thus Jesus takes His place as the Second Adam. Remember now the first Adam, how he had likewise fallen into a deep sleep, and out of his side came a bone, from which God fashioned the woman, Eve. But Jesus is greater than Adam, and therefore not a bone, but blood and water come out of Jesus' side. For blood and water, and not bones, are the elements of life. And as the element from the first Adam's side produced the first bride, so now the elements from the Greater Adam's side produce the greater Bride, which is the Church. For these elements the blood and water of Christ are the very elements we find in the blessed Sacraments."

L: He was cut off from the land of the living.

C: For the transgression of My people He was stricken.


Collect

C: Because by Your holy cross You have redeemed the world.

Gospel Reading Luke 23:50-56

Meditation from David Scaer

"Burials do mean that something has come to an end, but more importantly, they are steps in God's plan of salvation for the followers of Jesus. The God who created us body and soul and again recreated us in Baptism is, by our own burials, preparing us for the resurrection from the dead. The dead are sown like seeds into the earth, so that at the dawning of the Resurrection sun they might spring forth into eternal life. "If we die with Him, we shall also reign with Him." Every baptized Christian has already been buried with Christ, and every burial is a Baptism into His life. Paul said this: "We are buried with Christ by Baptism into His death, that even as God raised Him from the dead, we should walk in newness of life."

L: You will not leave My soul in Sheol:

C: Nor will You allow Your Holy One to see corruption.

L: Let us pray:

C: O Jesus, who lay in death's strong bands and rested on the Great Sabbath day after Your labors, dwell within my heart so that coming at last to the end of my labors I may rest eternally with You. Amen.
